- Medical humanities is a diverse field of scholarship that may include
 - literature and poetry,
 - the visual and performing arts,
 - history of medicine,
 - and ethics,
- ...as these relate to
 - patients' illness experiences,
 - the doctor-patient relationship,
 - physician self-care

and other aspects of healthcare

What you do at SOM?

- 1) Teach elective classes and course components in both the preclinical and clinical years
- 2) Supervise independent medical student research in medical humanities
- 3) Organize special events symposia, dramatic/musical performances, public lectures, art exhibits
- 4) Faculty advisor for Plexus
- 5) My own research on medical student empathy, socialization, wellness through the arts

How you arrived at this position?

By a very circuitous and unintentional route. The beginning and turning points:

- 1) My background PhD in women's studies and counseling psychology intention to be a feminist scholar and direct an academic women's center. That didn't come to pass
- 2) Hired at Family Focus. Realized I was more interested in the effects of illnesses of the body on the mind and spirit than I was in illnesses of the mind
- 3) Applied to Family Medicine at UC Irvine as a lark. Ended up hired. Husband spent 2 yrs commuting back and forth.
- 4) Spent about 15 years as director of behavioral science functioned as a psychologist, but was a great opportunity to be an anthropologist on Mars, learning about physicians, patients, and medicine
- 5) Spent 5 years in administration, hating most of it; course director, clerkship director, interim chair
- 6) Personal encounter with illness led me to realize the healing power of literature
- 7) Wanted to retire first, teach a literature and medicine elective
- 8) Rest is history: from a single course, built a program with curriculum in all 4 years of med school; research opportunities in medical humanities for 1st and 4th yr students; special events; Plexus

What are your hopes in developing Medical Humanities amongst med students?

- Critical thinking and curiosity to bring a questioning gaze to accepted medical dynamics and practices
- 2) Empathy, compassion, and respect for the patient experience
- 3) Insight into the complexities and nuances of the doctor patient relationship
- 4) Self-awareness and self-reflection
- 5) Personal wellness and healing

What makes you hopeful?

1) Medical students' boundless enthusiasm to learn anything that might make them better doctors

2) Realization among medical educators of the value of humanities-based approaches

What are your ongoing and new challenges?

- 1) Lack of substantive administrative support
- 2) Difficulties of getting humanities experts to tailor their material to the clinical and professional realities of medicine
