DOCTORS, PATIENTS, FAMILIES AND HEART DISEASE

SUMMARY: "Angor Animi" John Stone, a cardiologist and professor at Emory University, who is also the author of three volumes of poetry. This brief story portrays a cardiologist who provides continuity care to a young man with a heart defect. Four years post open-heart surgery, the patient develops CHF and deteriorates. His mother is a loving background presence. No other family members are referred to. Mother and doctor discuss son's awareness of his impending death, before she interrupts her vigil to take a brief rest. While she is gone, the patient dies, the doctor weeps, and the EKG continues to show electrical activity until the mother's return.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

- 1. How would you describe the relationship between mother and son? Patient and doctor? Mother and doctor?
- 2. In what sense does the cardiologist "balance" the dynamic between mother and son?
- 3. What relational aspects make this a satisfying story, despite its pathos?

TRIANGULATION ISSUES:

- 1. Some Permanent Perfect Parent on part of both mother and son toward doctor
- 2. Mostly successful therapeutic alliance
 - a. Doctor balances mother-son dynamics
 - b. Doctor as surrogate father
 - c. Doctor's presence creates more stability, allows for more dynamic interactions
 - d. Mother supports doctor-patient relationship
