FAMILY PHYSICIAN ATTITUDES TOWARD AND PERCEPTIONS OF PATIENTS – REVISED 3/13/00

1. PURPOSE OF THE RESEARCH:

Statement of the Problem: "Difficult" patients have long been recognized as a problem in health care (1-3). Patients perceived as difficult frustrate their physicians (4,5). They are often high utilizers of health care (6,7), and are frequently characterized by the presence of various mental (8) and personality disorders (9) and multiple somatic symptoms (10,11). They also tend to have poorer functional status, more unmet expectations, less satisfaction with care, and perceived lack of control over their illness. It is often difficult to change the interactions of these patients and their physicians (12), although a variety of strategies has been employed from cognitive behavioral approaches to antidepressant drug therapy (13,14).

Yet despite evidence of frustration, we have little information about whether primary care providers are less empathic toward "difficult" as compared to "typical" patients. This study is a pilot investigation to determine whether, among a population of experienced clinicians, self-reported empathy is less when treating a perceived "difficult" patient.

Goals of the Project: Research Question: In a population of experienced primary care physicians, are there measurable differences between perceived "difficult" and "typical" patients in terms of physician self-reported frustration and empathy?

Hypothesis: The study hypothesizes that physician subjects will express more frustration and less empathy toward patients they perceive as difficult. Further, we hypothesize that frustration and empathy will be related to variables of patient age, ethnicity, gender, and diagnosis.

Specific aims: To answer the research question, the study will accomplish the following: 1) Practicing family physicians will be asked to evaluate their levels of frustration and empathy toward patients they perceive as difficult. 2) Six months later, these same physicians will be asked to complete the same questionnaire regarding a "typical" patient.

BACKGROUND OF INVESTIGATOR: Johanna Shapiro, Ph.D. Dr. Shapiro received her Ph.D. from Stanford University in 1975, and is a tenured professor in the University of California Irvine Department of Family Medicine, where she has taught for the past twenty years. She has over 60 empirical and theoretical publications and has experience directing several small research projects. She has published several case reports and conceptual articles on the use of patient narrative in health care.
