## **INTRODUCTION**

Slide 1: Good morning everyone we are going to get started. Welcome to the 1<sup>st</sup> – and we hope not last – Art of Medicine symposium. I'm Johanna Shapiro, chair of the planning committee, so I'm the one to come to with questions, complaints, and hopefully positive feedback!

Welcome to all our UCI medical students, and thank you for being such wonderful Renaissance learners.
