JOHANNA SHAPIRO, PH.D. OUTSTANDING FACULTY ACHIEVEMENT

An old folk riddle asks, "What is truer than the truth?" According to Johanna Shapiro, the answer is, "a good story." That's where, she explains, "a deeper truth can be found." Not unlike the idea of finding truth somewhere in the middle of any two people's account of the same incident, finding the missing link that connects a patient's story with known science requires more mindful patient-doctor communication.

As a narratologist and professor emeritus in the School of Medicine's Department of Family Medicine where she also directs the Medical Humanities & Arts Program, Johanna's contributions are so extensive, she's defined as being the medical humanities. In fact, she single-handedly created and nurtured the medical humanities curriculum within the School of Medicine.

She is recognized not simply for these reasons, or because of her 159 published, peer-reviewed manuscripts or NIH research grant – or because she innovatively uses literature, art, theatre and film to prompt deep reflection and help convey the importance of empathetic listening – or even because she plays Folk guitar and sings. Oh no, Johanna Shapiro is also recognized for being, "an exquisite pearl of a person," "ever kind," "generous and empathetic" - the kind of person who serves selflessly and tirelessly, who tenaciously follows through on her convictions, who is not deterred by roadblocks, and who loves her students.

So perhaps there is something else truer than the truth. Perhaps it's found in truths spawned by the initial truth itself – the ever-so-critical foundational truth. If so, Johanna Shapiro's teachings, research and service will provide for more fruitful, empathetic conversations and better health outcomes for generations to come. That's the exponential truth!
