


Q1 - Please rate the Illuminations "Poetry of Hope and Healing" event. How well did the event meet your expectations?





All of the Contributors were absolutely wonderful! The one I liked best was Dr. Thelma Reyna. It is so unfortunate that her contributions were interrupted by the vagaries of ZOOM technology. Her story and her poetry pierced the armor of my spirit. I have lost 2 beloved family members to COVID-19 in the past several months. Her insights and her written words gave me a gift of hope and healing that I can really use as I work through the profound anger and grief that I am living with. I am thrilled with the connection between the Schools of Humanity and Medicine. It is a connection that serves both entities, their faculty, and students, so well. I will share that I worked as a Clinical Research Nurse for the SOM/Div. Infectious Diseases, for 20 years. Virtually all my work was with HIV/AIDS. During the first several years, we did not yet have effective anti-HIV treatment. All of the people we saw in our Clinic and who participated in our research projects were living with a death sentence. Together, we did great work, to discover ways to treat and prevent the opportunistic infections that were killing them. Our work was hard and often heartbreaking. We were an astoundingly collaborative and caring group. We supported each other unfailingly. In retrospect, I think if this collaboration between our Schools had been connected back then, we could have provided each other with food for the journey. Early on, I got to know Dr. Meyskens because a lot of our patients had cancer. He was unfailingly ethical, compassionate and supportive to everyone who came to UCI, in any capacity...colleagues, medical and admin support staff, patients, families. As one who had responsibilities for overseeing the ethics and proper conduct of Clinical Trials, he was unfailingly competent and protective of participants and investigators alike. He was always fair. His door was always open. He always listened more than he talked. He quickly became a hero and a role model for me and remains so until this day. I was so happy to see him and just thrilled to listen to his writing and his insights. I am sad that he has faced and endured so many illnesses in the past several years, but I was truly moved to tears by his tribute to nurses who cared for him. Finally, I want to say that while I appreciate her enthusiasm, I was really put off by the amount of time that Jayne Lewis took to express her own responses and thoughts.to the presentations and to the questions from the audience. She took too much time away from the contributors. Finally, I want to express my sincere and really profound gratitude to absolutely everyone who worked on this project in any capacity.
