COMMENTS TO EDITOR: This poem implicitly contrasts the EHR and all it has brought with it (including the hated and now outdated "meaningful use" protocols) with "old-style" case records kept on 3x5 cards and in the doctor's mind and heart. Reviews were quite split. One reviewer didn't really think it was a poem and didn't find the daydreaming physician-typist credible. The second reviewer, however, thought the poem was pretty much perfect with depth and humor. I agree with reviewer 2.
